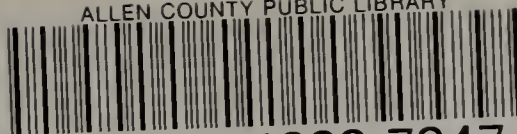

We should think of the many hardships endured by this pioneer family, their limited faculties, trials and tribulations.

This history has taken several years to compile, together with a vast amount of labor to which I dedicate to you and yours. It would be impossible to have the genealogy in this book up-to-date, owing to the many changes, however, it was complete when data was taken on each family. Blank pages have been inserted for correction and additions.

The greatest stress, in completing this volume, has been placed on the early history, which I believe will be the most interesting to the present generation. About a few members of the early families, it has been impossible to secure complete information, hence we were compelled to go to press with just meager material.

We have the deepest appreciation for those who so diligently labored to gather material to make possible the printing of this book. It is hoped that this history will unite the members of this family more closely; doing deeds of kindness for those who need help.

Early History



Many years ago, there lived in Ireland a family by the name of Patrick and one in Scotland by the name of Kirk. A few miles of water separated them, and after a time the Patrick families journeyed across the narrow channel in sailing vessels to the shores of Scotland, where they united with the Kirk families to form a border clan in Dampiershire, near Solway Firth, Scotland. In the uniting of these two families, they elected a chief who lived in Clovernook Castle, which is still in a good state of preservation. The date these families were united is unknown, but it is believed to have been several hundred years ago. The clan, now named Kirkpatrick, was large and wealthy, so part of them lived in Ireland and part in Scotland. Before the reign of Henry VIII, the Kirkpatrick families embraced the Catholic faith as their religion. Henry VIII had so many marriages and divorces that they were not approved of by the Pope, and in time caused a break between Church and State, and most of the subjects of Henry VIII embraced a new religious order; the Presbyterian Church. The Kirkpatrick families were among the first to join the new order, and they still belonged to it when they sailed for America. Samuel and his family were members of the same Church at Collinsville, Ohio, which was erected several years after they emigrated to Ohio. Samuel was married in Pennsylvania about 1802, and in 1809 started westward with his family. His brother John, at about the same time, came to Ohio, but did not live long after arriving at his new home.

Early History



The early history of the United States is a story of exploration, discovery, and the struggle for independence. It begins with the first European settlers who arrived on the eastern coast of North America in the early 17th century. It is not known where he settled or anything about his family, or where he is buried. On arrival in Wayne Township, Butler County, Samuel decided to make this his home, which was one and one-half mile east of Collinsville, Ohio. A few settlers had come to this section of the State at this time, but his nearest neighbor was miles away. Fort Hamilton was 12 miles to the south on the banks of the Great Miami River, and his nearest trading post. Fort Hamilton then was a military post for protection against the Indians. On arrival at this new home he at once began the task of building a log house for his family, which he did, a small cabin, about 18 feet wide and about 24 feet in length, and built at the junction of two streams at the foot of a hill. The door and windows faced the south, and a stone chimney was built on the east. This cabin was torn away about 1886. Samuel and his family lived in this cabin for several years when a new home, a two story log structure was erected on a hill about two hundred feet south of his first home. About three hundred feet east of his new home he built a large log barn that was in use until a few years ago. The house is still standing and occupied; it has been remodeled but the original log part is still in use.

When Samuel settled on this tract it was a wilderness, wooded with beech, oak, walnut, hickory, poplar and sugar trees which he cleared with the help of his few neighbors, rolling the logs in huge piles and having a community bonfire, which lasted for several days, and in this way cleared the most of his 172 acre tract, which he purchased from the United States Government. This tract of land is located just one half mile west of "The Old Trace Road" made by General

Anthony Wayne in 1792, from Fort Hamilton to Greenville, Ohio, in pursuit of the Indians.

The furnishings of the first log cabin of this pioneer family were very meager. Their worldly goods were just what they could transport in their covered wagon. After their first cabin was erected, they made their beds from poles; their fireplace gave them warmth; their cooking was accomplished by a swinging crane above the fireplace. Oiled paper was used for window glass. After building his home, and as his family became larger, a huge stone oven was built a few feet from the house, where they baked and roasted meat. His wife spun the wool to make all the clothing they needed. Their home was lighted with candles, the molds they used are still in possession of one of the family, also their fireplace tongs and tin lantern supposed to be used on their trip from Pennsylvania, also the sickle used to cut their grain by hand.

The opportunity for an education of Samuel's children was very limited and it is presumed that most of their learning was given by the parents. It was several years after he settled in this section that a log school was erected. It was located about three miles northeast of his home and the children walked this distance night and morning. In those days the children did not attend school regularly; they were needed for work on the farm.

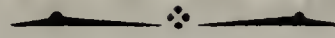

Benjamin Kirkpatrick



Benjamin Kirkpatrick, the father of Samuel, is the earliest relative we have any record of in this country and who lived in Westmoreland County, Pennsylvania. It is not known if he was one of the members who came from Ireland many years ago. It is not known the number of children in his family, but four survived him at his death in 1826; Rebecca Samuel, Polly and Benjamin Jr. Another son, John, came to Ohio with or about the time Samuel emigrated. He died in Ohio before the death of his father.

Benjamin fought with the Colonies in the Revolutionary War, and has a Revolutionary War marker. He is buried in the Poke Run Cemetery, in Westmoreland County, Pennsylvania.

Samuel Kirkpatrick, son of Benjamin and Jane Kirkpatrick was born in Westmoreland County, Pennsylvania, December 7, 1779. He married in Pennsylvania and had four children when he emigrated to Ohio in 1809. He settled on a tract of land in Wayne Township, Butler County, near Collinsville. Samuel was a very jolly man, always ready to play a joke on someone. Barbara came from a family of slave owners, she was rather stern and not very tolerant. Samuel spent the rest of his life on this farm, rearing a large family and died at the age of seventy years on October 27, 1849.

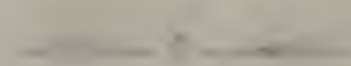
First child of Samuel and Barbara Kirkpatrick, was born on September 3, 1803, in Westmoreland County, Pennsylvania. He emigrated to Ohio with his parents in 1809. He went to Carroll County, Indiana and entered Government land and purchased it on October 2, 1831. He married Hannah McCain on March 11, 1830 and with his wife and two children moved from Butler County, Ohio, in 1833 and settled fourteen miles south of Logansport, Indiana. He and his family were supposed to be the first white settlers in Carrollton Township. When they came, there were plenty of Indians. They were fond of corn bread and had to keep in hiding from them at all times. When Benjamin and his neighbors journeyed to Delphi, to pay their taxes, which required two days to make the trip, the Indians knowing the men folks were away, would come to the house and dance before the fireplace until late at night, then sleep on the floor until morning, and leaving without molesting the family.

Benjamin died on September 30, 1880, at the age of seventy-seven years.

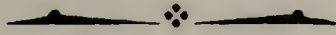

Second child of Samuel and Barbara Kirkpatrick was born on November 12, 1804, in Westmoreland County, Pennsylvania, and emigrated with his parents to Butler County, Ohio in 1809. He lived in Ohio until he joined his brothers in Carroll Township, Carroll County, Indiana, where he purchased Government land. He died on October 23, 1839 at the age of thirty-five years. His widow Eliza was appointed guardian of the minor heirs of Johnson on November 8, 1841. He is buried in Rock Creek cemetery, six miles south of Logansport, Indiana.
